Payments to students receiving free/reduced price school meals who missed school due to COVID impacts

Eviction moratorium ends

All pandemic eviction moratorium protections are lifted Throughout the pandemic, school meals have been free for all kids. Federal authorization runs out at the end of the school year.

Final payment of P-EBT for school year 2021-22 will be issued in June. No official word yet on Summer EBT for Minnesota.

E-SNAP payments wind down 60 days from the end of the federal Public Health Emergency, currently set to expire this July

Emergency SNAP

Background:

- E-SNAP started in April 2020
- Provides up to maximum allotment for household size, or \$95 if already at the maximum
- Requires federal and state public health emergency. Federal PHE currently runs out July 15, 2022
- If July 2022 is the last month of the PHE, last round of benefits issued in September 2022
- Since the beginning of the pandemic MN has distributed \$921,782,847 in emergency SNAP benefits
- E-SNAP was distributed to 336,500 households comprised of 698,222 individuals




WIC changes

- COVID waivers allowed WIC to see participants remotely (online or by phone), expected to return to in-person visits by mid-October
- Cash value for fruit & vegetables increased through September. Currently \$24
 monthly for children, \$43 monthly for women, \$47 for breastfeeding women
 (normally \$8 for children, \$11 for women)

What impact does this have on people who struggle with food insecurity?



Mary

- 71 years old
- Lives alone
- Income: \$1,620/month in social security
- Rent/mortgage: \$0
- Insurance & property taxes: \$240/month
- Utilities: ~\$300 month (electric, gas, water, trash, phone)
- Medical expenses: \$450/month



Mary

- Eligible for about \$20 / month in SNAP benefits
- Due to pandemic E-SNAP, receiving \$250/month
- When E-SNAP ends, where will she find \$230 extra dollars for food?



Sara

- 25 years old
- Single mom with a 2-year-old daughter
- Income: \$2,257/month (35 hours/week, \$15 hour)
- Rent: \$1,100
- Utilities: ~\$150 month (electric, gas, water, phone)
- Childcare: \$193/week



Sara

- Eligible for about \$213 / month in SNAP benefits
- Due to pandemic E-SNAP, receiving \$459/month
- When E-SNAP ends, where will she find \$246 extra dollars for food?
- Eligible for WIC
- Set package of juice, milk, cereal, eggs, bread, beans
- Pandemic added \$16 in cash value for fruits & veggies for kids,
 \$32 for women
- (back to \$8/month and \$11/month after pandemic waiver ends)



Daniel

- 50 years old
- Single, 2 adult children
- Income: \$3,120/month (40 hours/week, \$18 hour)
- Rent: \$950
- Utilities: ~\$135 month (electric, gas, water, phone/internet)
- Health care costs: premium \$310/month after tax credits;
 \$100 in prescriptions, office co-pays



Daniel


- Makes too much to qualify for SNAP
- Rising food prices forced him to look for help
- Visits food shelf once-a-month, but seeing less food available



- Market Bucks is a farmers market incentive program designed to help SNAP customers increase their purchasing power at farmers markets.
- SNAP customers can use their EBT card at 100+ participating farmers market locations and receive a dollar-for-dollar match on all SNAP spending at the market, up to \$10.

Get \$10 in free Market Bucks AND \$10 in Produce Market Bucks!

Up to \$10 of each per market visit.
 The full amount doesn't have to be spent each time.



Shop for SNAP-eligible foods & produce items at the farmers market.




How it works
